Classroom News

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We had fun with the unit of inquiry this week! Our brain and five senses are amazing! Ask your child about popcorn and the senses. Next week we will look more in-depth into the senses of sight and hearing.

In Math, we will finish our inquiry into measuring capacity. We will practice addition and subtraction from 20. We will read the book, <u>Cats and Kittens.</u> There are some games on the site that the children can play <u>https://schmedia.pearsoncanada.ca/mlb/index.html?code=16SS</u>

Numeracy Ideas How Many 1s? Use small objects to represent cats, and fold a piece of paper to make a hiding spot. Start with about 15 "cats." Ask your child to turn away while you place (5) "cats" in the hiding spot. Your child then looks at the (10) visible "cats" and predicts how many are hiding. Lift the paper and count to check. Encourage the use of numbers to describe the story. For example, say: "10 and 5—that's 15 cats." or "5 cats are hiding and 10 cats are not. That's 15 cats altogether." Repeat with other combinations of that number (15) or start with another number. Invite your child to take the lead.

Literacy Ideas: Read a book and look for connections the child can make to their senses of sight and hearing. Write about things that they see and hear.
